

Horse Budget



Owning a horse can be a fantastic and rewarding experience but it is a time consuming hobby and caring for a horse is a huge financial commitment. Before owning a horse, you will need to be clear about where and how you will keep it and how its care will be financed.

To help you budget, we have listed some common costs associated with looking after a horse or pony. Remember to prioritise those items which are most important and purchase only what you need. Some costs will only be incurred once but others will be repeated monthly or annually.

Purchasing your Hor	se	Cost
Viewing prospective horses	 Ask questions about all aspects of the horse before viewing. Are good quality photos available? Ask for video footage to see the horse in action. If you are unable to find a horse locally, you may have to travel a considerable distance or view a number of horses before you find your perfect match. 	
Vetting Fee	 Three main options, no vetting, two stage vetting and five stage vetting. In some instances, insurance cover may be dependent on a successful vetting. 	
Trainer/Instructor Fee	 Your instructor may be happy to accompany you to view a prospective purchase and a second opinion may be invaluable 	
Horse Purchase	 Are any rugs or tack included? When are vaccinations/farrier next due? 	
Transportation	 Do you have your own transportation? If not, you may need to hire a trailer or box or arrange for a specialist equine transporter to get your horse home. 	
Passport/Transfer of Ownership Fee	 A fee is usually payable for changes to passports, the cost varies depending on the issuing body.

Stabling & Feed		Cost
Livery Fees	 Different livery options are available with DIY the cheapest and full the most expensive. Generally charged weekly but may be payable monthly. 	
Bedding	 There are many different bedding types available at various costs. You will need to choose the best option for you and your horse. Consider the use of stable matting, it can reduce the amount of bedding required and cut mucking out times. Does your horse need to be stabled in the winter? With sufficient shelter and good quality rugs, many can winter out successfully. 	
Forage	 Consider using big bales or bulk buying for discounts. Feed hay little and often to prevent wastage through trampling or use a hay net or rack. 	
Feed	 Consider what feed you will need for the job your horse will do. If you are unsure, contact one of the nutrition helplines, they can help you get value for money by recommending appropriate feeding regimes for your needs. 	
Supplements	 If you are going to feed supplements, consider which ones you believe are necessary and benefit the health of your horse.

Stable Equipment		Cost
Buckets/Trugs	• For water and feed.	
Hay Rack/Nets	 Personal choice, hay can be fed from the floor but this can sometimes lead to wastage. 	
Wheelbarrow	 Some equipment may be provided for your use as part of your livery. 	
Fork, shovel, brush	 Shop around at discount stores or markets for your buckets, yard brushes and cleaning materials, they are often less expensive than specialist stores. 	
Stable toys	 Cheap and safe stable toys can be made with a little creativity. 	
Other	• Will your stable need any grills? Tying up rings?

Your Horse's Health		Cost
Vaccinations	 Generally administered annually but will be more often if starting a new course of vaccinations. Co-ordinate routine treatments such as vaccinations and teeth with others in the same yard to share call out costs. 	
Dentist	• Every 6-12 months.	
Farrier	 Horses will require either trimming or shoeing every 6-8 weeks. If barefoot, additional boots may be required for some activities. 	
Worm Management	 You need a worm management program which may involve administering worming treatments or undertaking worm counts 	
Horse & Rider Insurance	 Premiums can be paid monthly or annually Ensure cover is appropriate for your and your horse's needs. Check your method of payment, charges may be applied for monthly payments or credit cards.

Your Horse's Wardrob	Cost	
Head Collar & Lead Rope	 If you need new equipment, shop around. If you know what you are looking for, you can easily compare prices online and mail order may be cheaper than the cost of visiting a store. 	
Travel Boots	 If you will only need the item occasionally borrow from a friend. 	
Tail Bandage/Guard	 Bargains can be picked up at equine boot sales or online. 	
Stable Rug	• Rugs may be cheaper to buy "out of season".	
Turnout Rug	 Have your rugs washed and reproofed, it will extend their life. 	
Other Rugs	 Coolers, show sheet, fly rugs. These rugs may not be necessary but can add to the comfort of your horse.

Bridle	Including Bit.	
Martingale/Breastplate	Do you need one?	
Saddle	Including girth, stirrups, stirrup leathers.	
Saddlecloth/Numnah	Vary from basic saddlecloth to specialist numnahs	
Leg Protection	 Various boots are available including, brushing, tendon, over reach and knee. Do you need any?

Grooming & First Ai	Grooming & First Aid Kit Cost		
Brushes & Combs	 Cheap rubber gloves are excellent for removing hair during shedding season. Old human hair brushes make great mane and tail combs. 		
Sponge and Sweat Scraper	 Human shampoo for can be great for horse baths and are cheaper too! 		
Hoof Pick	Necessary and often lost!		
Scissors	 Old kitchen scissors may be suitable but consider safety needs. 		
First Aid Kit	 Check with your vet, generally would include a poultice, antibacterial scrub, wound gel or powder, dressings, gamgee, bandages, tape & a thermometer. 		
Kit box/bag	 Old sports or cooler bags make great storage for grooming kits.

Rider Wardrobe		Cost
Riding Hat	 Ensure it conforms to the appropriate safety standards. 	
Footwear	Boots with a small heel.	
Jodhpurs, Coat, Gloves	 You may also consider a body protector which is compulsory for some competitions. Hi-viz clothing is recommended if you will be hacking on roads.

Training and Competitions		Cost
Lessons	 Arrange group lessons to share instructor costs or club together with friends to hire indoor arenas for extra schooling. 	
Competition Entry Fees	Discounts may be offered for early booking.	
Transportation	 Share transport with others if you are attending the same event, not only does it save fuel but also gives you moral support and companionship.
